The tri-color paint on my 1980 Dodge Mirada is not factory, but then, little else is. I always liked the looks of these cars way back when, but as a college student I could not afford one. Nearly 15 years later I bought this fine example which had spent a year in the Metro Impound with the windows down. There is a little rust on the right quarter, but the floor, trunk, and frame are in great shape. All the odd sheet metal replaces the pieces dented and bent by the bar tender who lost it to the impound. The 318 CI boat an-chor which resided under the hood, along with the 904 and 291 geared 8.25 rear end are history. In their place went a .30 over 440 with hypereutectic pistons, stock rods, heads, cast crank, .509" lift cam, Edelbrock single plane with a Holly 750 double pumper, Mopar electronic ignition, Headman coated headers and 3" dual exhaust. That was dropped in on elephant ears and hooked to a manual reverse pattern 727, an Body drive shaft, and an E Body 8.75 with a 456 gear. The car is a long way from complete, but it'll run up and down the road and it sounds great

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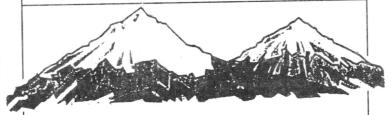
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A Rose By Any Other Name . . .

Here I go again, opening a can of worms with regard to the conduct of the Automobile manufacturers during the horsepower derby that was the 60's. Many of us remember magazine road tests of certain muscle cars, thereby elevating them to legendary status, and later discovering that the everyday GTO. or GTX couldn't come near the published numbers of the day. These cars were known by many names, including: "Ringer," "one-off," "blueprint verification vehicle." and my personal favorite, "engineering exercise." It's funny how when it came time for an important road test these were the cars that made it into the hands of the test team.

In the Spring of 1969 I had the opportunity of going on a road test for Super Stock and Drag Illustrated. Now I wasn't a part of that road test, now was I anyone special other than a team driver for Berger Chevrolet (sorry folks, that was before my conversion) of Grand Rapids, Michigan. The late, great Roger Huntington was the writer (he couldn't do the testing because he was in a wheelchair and a ZL-1 Aluminum 427 Camaro didn't have hand controls), and the tester was to be Dick Griffin, national record holding Chrysler "hot shoe." Berger assembled a contingent of "engineering exercise" cars to attend this event a U.S. 131, Martin Dragway. This contingent included a 427 Chevelle, a 427 Nova, a 302 Z-28, and my Corvair 110 Sprint (a 110 H.P. with the 140 H.P. camshaft). All of these cars were "ringers" easily capable of outperforming ANY of the like vehicles on the Berger lot, and we all knew it... But the best was yet to come.

We proceeded in a caravan to Martin Dragway and met Dick Griffin there - Huntington rode down in the ZL-1. When we graced the gates we happen to notice that Griffin came with some cars of his own to "sort out" prior to the upcoming Popular Hot Rodding Magazine "Pure Stock Nationals." Griffin came with a GTX, a Road Runner, and a 440 'Cuda. . . BATTLE STATIONS!

Now we knew we had to have Griffin covered, and that the ZL-1 all aluminum 427 would be the star of the day, heck we planned it that way. My Corvair was a mid 15 second car - that put it in a virtual dead heat with most Road Runners of the "garden variety." The 302 Z-28 was certainly capable of low 14's and all the 427 cars had to be solid 13 second cars. (If these times sound slow, remember back to the tires of the day - Wide Ovals. . . AND I'm talking verifiable numbers here not someone's 12 second mouth) Odd thing was that all of Griffin's cars had their class designations on the windows and ours did not.

The ZL-1 had tons of traction problems and whatever technique you used, the best time anyone could must was a 13.38 at 104. (The anyone who ran it was Griffin). Big disappointment for us there. With the test concluded, it was time to play. You see, we wen getting ready of the Pop Rod event too. The Nova figured to B/PS. the Malibu to C/PSA, and the Z-28 to F/PS. Griffin's cars figured this way: "Cuda B/PSA, GTX D/PSA, and Road Runner F/SPA. It was time to SHOW Griffin some bowtie boogie. WRONG. . . Seems as Mr. Griffin had some help from Mr. Hoover and Mr. Shepard and his "engineering exercises" made the bowties look like Bozo the clown. How about a PURE STOCK, UNTOUCHED 1969 440 'Cuda running 13.10 at over 107 on street tires. . . His GTX ran 13.41 at over 105, and the most astounding of all was a 13.66 at 102 from the Road Runner. . . No one though the Runner could eclipse the Z-28, but it did by two full tenths. My Corvair ran it's usual 15.65 numbers... But for Q/PS tat was stout, but I was glad they didn't have a slant six valiant. . .

Two months late I was the owner of a 1967 GTX. That car is now in the hands of club member David Hite. It was also an "engineering exercise." In E/PSA it ran 13.63 at 104 with a 3.23 gear. . . Go figure. I never got beat in that car. . .

These cars are still out there and you might end up with one without ever knowing it. Norman Chesney of Knoxville, TN is the owner of one. Most recently I have discovered what had to be one in the form of a 1968 Road Runner belonging to Robert Turney. (The engine that is). . . Upon doing some work, I discovered that things fit TOO DARN GOOD. The exhaust ports and intake ports, though they show NO signs of grinding are perfectly matched to the intake and exhaust gaskets. The intake has NO rough spots and sign of grinding. Who knows you might just have one of these cars in your collection.

Ways to spot these cars is to look for vehicles not heavily optioned, ones with manual steering, sure grip axles (usually 3.91 in a big block and 4.30 in a small block), and less than obtrusive colors - forget the Sub-lime Green and Panther Pink, try for bronze, metallic blue, yellow (not lemon twist either), white and red. Look for telltale details such as "EXTRA" wax pencil or marker writing in the trunk area or under carriage. Look also for stuff that should not be there but is. Like a Dana in a 383 Road Runner 4-speed, or in a 440 automatic car. Huge air breathers that look all wrong on the car but came on them none the less. (Sorry Galen Govier, you know alot, but not all - neither do I for that matter). You might discover some aluminum alloy parts under the grease and factory paint. The carrier of your 8 3/4 may be of a light alloy. Bottom line is - it's out there. When it comae to engineering exercises, all was fair. In fact, David Hite has probably the ONLY 1967 GTX that came from the factory with an AVS. The factory rep who was issued that car for evaluation was James Earle of New Baltimore, Michigan, and he will attest to the fact that they way he sold it to me was the way it was delivered to him. It was also the 47th GTX built.

Sorry for rambling on, but I was having such fun. Next time I will focus on the MIGHTY V-6 (I'm not being funny when I say MIGHTY either). Till then, keep it safe and may the Pentistar shin brightly in your eyes.

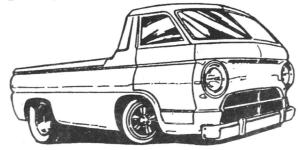
